

The eternal purpose which He purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord runs from age to age. It has been so before the foundation of the world; it will be so until time and history are no more. Our part in this great scheme of things seems so meagre, fragmentary and transient. However, we can take comfort and courage from the words of Holy Scripture recorded in the sixth chapter of the Epistle to the Hebrews, verse 3: "For God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which we have showedtoward His name, in that ye have ministered to the saints and do minister."

So it is that we bring a proper perspective to another year of labour in this part of the vineyard in which we have been called to serve.

The year that is past should not occupy too much of our time either by way of self-congratulation or vain regret. Present time and reality are much more important; the future holds out great opportunities and challenges. Yet if we are to chart our course for the days ahead we must look back to see the road along whence we came. That is really what we try to do at an Annual Vestry Meeting.

The year that is past has been one of satisfaction, fulfillment and progress. Many people have worked very hard to make it so and I thank all who have supported us in any way. Especially do I thank the members of the various organizations. This book records in some measure their activities.

I wish to thank the Church Secretary, Mrs. J.W. Lawson for her efficient and capable services always carried out in a cheerful manner; Mr. Harold Lane for his devotion to the care of the Church and grounds; Mr. Alex Ogden who in many ways from Carilloneur to Lay Reader makes a fine contribution to the Church;

After four years of excellent leadership to the choir, Mr. James Leonard had, by reason of employment, to leave the post of organist. We enjoyed his stay amongst us and wish him well in his future career.

It was our pleasure to welcome as organist, Mr. Gary Gray. In the short time Mr. Gray has been with us, he has already made his mark. We appreciate his many fine qualities and hope that he will be with us for many years. It is important for the worship and liturgy of the Church to have a capable organist and a well-trained choir. We in St. John's are fortunate to have both of these and we express our deepest thanks to all who share in the musical leadership of the Church.

The financial side of the Church's life is of necessity very important. We are pleased to know that our books and records are kept in first-class condition. For the peace of mind that this brings we extend our thanks to Mr. J.W. Lawson, Church Treasurer and Mrs. W. Shortt, Envelope Secretary.

Our administration remains top-flight and we as a Parish are continually blessed with able persons who offer themselves for the office of Church Warden. We bid farewell but not good-bye to our genial People's Warden, Mr. Dudley Young. We will miss his good humour and the unruffled manner in which he views things but as with former Wardens, we know that we will have the benefit of his advice and help whenever so desired.

To our Rector's Warden, Mr. Arthur Sim, I express thanks on behalf of us all and along with our incoming People's Warden our leadership continues at a high level.

We as a congregation have enjoyed a good year. The highlight was the dedication of our Parish Hall renovations on September 10, 1972, by the Bishop of Toronto, the Right Reverend L.S. Garnsworthy. I wish to thank the congregation for their part in making this effort so enjoyable. We record once again our gratitude to the trustees of the R.L. Baker Foundation for their generous help in assisting us with this project.

Once again, we shared joint services in the summer with our good neighbours of St. Paul's, Runnymede. We were sorry to learn of the illness of Archdeacon Lark and we pray that he will soon be restored to good health once more.

I sincerely want to thank the members of the congregation for their encouraging response to the Stewardship Campaign. Our pledges for the coming year are up substantially and this is gratifying to us all. I think it is a pleasant thought to note that the last Stewardship Report of the late Mr. Frank Munroe was an encouraging one. It is hard for us to realize that Frank has passed away but we will ever be grateful to Frank and Irene for the tireless efforts they have extended over the years on behalf of Stewardship. As a result of their fine work the high level of givings in our Parish is held up as an example to other congregations in the Diocese.

We continue to take services at Runnymede Hospital on the third Sunday of each month. May I express my grateful thanks to the volunteers who give of their time so generously.

As we turn now to the future, there are two verses from the Book of Proverbs which hold wisdom for us. The first is "Victory is the fruit of long planning." Proverbs 11:14 (N.E.B.) Heeding this admonition, and with the consent of the Church Wardens and Advisory Board, we plan to hold a Parish Planning Conference on Friday, March 2, and Saturday, March 3. This a programme designed by members of the Parish with the assistance of a Parish Administration consultant. The overall goal is spiritual renewal through Ministry by Objective. At the time of writing of this report, the details have not been worked out but it is hoped that these will be available at the time of the annual Vestry Meeting. The second quotation which comes from Proverbs is: "Where there is no vision, the people perish." (Proverbs 29:18).

The first objective of the Parish Planning Conference is to involve the concerned members of the congregation in working out a clear Parish Purpose, and setting goals and objectives for action programmes. A Purpose Centred Way of Life is basic to the Christian Faith.

Ministry by objective is a way of working with people, whereby commitment to a common purpose and clear objectives at all levels of the Church produces a sense of direction, unity and team-work, which is the most effective way to achieve results, and express the faith and mission of the Church.

#### COMMENTS ON OUR PROPOSED 1973 BUDGET

#### EXPENDITURES

- 1. We have made some modest selective salary adjustments.
- 2. We have of necessity allowed for increases in taxes, maintenance, etc.
- 3. Our Synod Assessment and Outreach are the same as last year.
- 4. Our largest extra expenditure for 1973 is of course re-payment of the loan based on payments of \$200.00 monthly.
- 5. The Advisory Board has suggested that 1,500. be taken from the 1972 surplus and if necessary be applied to renovations of the Rectory.

#### INCOLE

- 1. Your Budget Committee has been very conservative in projecting income, it is a very realistic budget.
- 2. We are assuming no income from the Parish House in 1973. It would seem that our proposed rental project has fallen through; but it is more than likely that your Wardens will come up with some project that will give at least some income for 1973.

Many thanks to Bill Shortt for serving on our committee and sharing his experience with us. Unfortunately this year Warren Godson had a prior commitment and could not attend the Budget Meeting. May I pay a personal tribute to Mr. Frank Munroe. Prior to his illness, he headed our Stewardship Committee and prepared our income analysis. On many occasions your Warden sought Frank's advice, not only did he have expertise, but he shared this with others by expressing his ideas at various meetings ... Our best tribute to Frank is the continuation of the work at St. John's which was so much a part of his life. Our new Treasurer has been of great assistance - a treasurer has the difficult task of keeping the wardens in "Financial Line" and at the same time leaving policy to them, he has scored well on this.
