

RECTOR'S REPORT 1962

TO THE PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS OF ST. JOHN'S WEST TORONTO:

"The Christian Family in the Family Church" has been our motto for the year 1962. It was chosen with the hope that it would do two things- (1) emphasize the importance of the Christian family as a unit in modern society- (2) enhance a very real and wholesome family feeling within our Church.

Not always do all the members of a family agree on all points, but there are certain qualities found in good families that should be evident in the Christian family of the Church- forgiveness, consideration, mutual help, love and loyalty. For these things we strive in the Name and in the Spirit of Christ and we trust that the past year has drawn us more closely together in the important work committed to us in this community. May newcomers to our Parish find satisfying and enduring fellowship amongst us.

Once again I wish to thank the Staff of St. John's for their co-operation and zeal. Few parishioners realize the amount of work that is done in the Church Office or the very great care with which it must be done. Mrs. Audrey Addleton and Mrs. Muriel Lawson who alternate in the office, give of their best without stint at wage rates that by no means approximate their worth to the Parish. We take our Organist quite for granted too, but it should be realized that we have in Mr. Percy MacDonald a combination of two important characteristics—an outstanding musician and a conscientious churchman. The loyalty and excellence of our choir are a testimony to his ability to make beautiful music a vital part of our worship. To Mr. MacDonald and the Choir go our sincerest thanks.

The Reverend Mervyn S. Everall, who with his wife Myra and child Dianne, came to us last May, has won a place in the Parish. To him has been given the task of leading our young people, and the response gives evidence not only of his popularity but of his ability in this field. It is a pleasure to work with Mr. Everall and we are happy that he is to be with us until 1965. We all wish him God's blessing as he looks forward to his ordination to the priesthood in May 1963.

A pipe organ is a wondrous giant whose speaking tubes are activated by impulses carried by miles of wire from the console to hundreds of tiny magnets in the organ chamber. The giant's pipes must be voiced, pitched and tuned continually and his complicated electrical system kept operating efficiently. To do all this is the task of the organ builder, and in Mr. David Legge of the Legge Organ Company Limited we have one who is not only highly skilled technically but who has a very great personal interest in our fine organ...and in our Parish. The amount of time and effort expended freely upon the organ because of this concern is great and we owe him a debt of gratitude for much done beyond financial responsibility.

During the past year a number of memorials have been presented.

The Exposed Great Organ, given to the glory of God and in tribute to C. Franklin Legge and Ada Richardson Legge, by their son, David.

White Burse and Veil, by the Coronation Unit of the Women's Guild, to the glory of God and in fond memory of Marjorie Stokes, founder of the Unit.

Each represents sacrifice on the part of the donor and a desire to maintain the high standards of the past in the challenging future. As a parish we are extremely grateful for these additions to the beauty of our church. Two further memorials are already considered for the coming year and of course will be dedicated as each is completed and presented.

The outstanding and at the same time most demanding event of 1962 was our Parish Family Mission conducted by the Rt. Rev. W.W. Davis, Coadjutor Bishop of Nova Scotia who upon the retirement of Bishop Waterman in June will become Bishop of Nova Scotia. We are thankful for Bishop Davis' leadership and we extend to him (in anticipation) our best wishes for a long and blessed ministry as Diocesan. I wish to thank the many persons who showed a keen interest in our Mission and gave liberally of their time and efforts in planning and preparation. Those who attended became aware of their involvement in the Church as the Body of Christ and of how the Church must express the character of Christ from the reality of His Incarnation to the sacrifice of His Passion and the power of His Resurrection. But the Church...our Church... is YOU and I...and others like us. Thus we must seek to be filled with the Spirit of Christ so that our community and our world may know the truth and the recreating power of the Christian Gospel. This is our unending task.

You will have noted from the financial statement that our income for 1962 was not quite as great as that for 1961. Nevertheless we thank God for His blessing and praise Him for the spirit of ardent stewardship that there is in our midst. A number of our people have adopted the practice of tithing and have known the deep satisfaction that comes from it. Because of the response to our appeal in November we believe that we shall be able to budget for 1963 an amount in excess of that budgeted for 1962.

In a Parish where so many population changes have taken place (and where they are still taking place) it is necessary that every effort be made to maintain a complete coverage of our Parish area. To this end a special committee has been formed to consider our zoning system and the parochial distribution of our sidesmen so that we have a continuing contact with every section of the Parish. Every parishioner can be of help by noting movements in your area and by notifying the Church Office of new arrivals.

Last October we commenced a regular Celebration of Holy Communion, each Wednesday at 10 a.m. At this service we remember by name parishioners and friends who are ill and for whom prayers have been requested. Here too we have a brief meditation upon prayer and its relationship to the health of spirit mind and body. From five to a dozen people are consistently present and we believe that those taking part have an important ministry in the life of the Parish. We trust, that after adequate study and preparation, the "Laying on of Hands and Anointing of the Sick" (Prayer Book p.584) will be a part of this special Celebration.

By now St. John's Parishioners should be well aware of my stand as an evange-lical churchman and my desire to maintain the very fine tradition of the Parish. During the past weeks one has felt the need of a Server's Guild which would embrace a number of young men in their later teens and give them a significant part to play in the life and worship of the Parish. A Server's Guild in itself has no doctrinal significance, is not ritualistic, but does bring young men into a continuing close contact with the clergy and the Church. Many a clergyman of the Anglican Communion has become aware of God's call to the ministry while active in a Server's Guild. While the institution of such an organization is the prerogative of a Rector, one wishes to know the mind of the Vestry and it is hoped that a motion relevant to this will be forthcoming at our Annual Meeting.

The "once-in-a-lifetime" event of 1963 will be the Anglican Congress to be held from August 13th to 23rd when Bishops, Clergy, and laymen from around the world will gather in Toronto to consider the place of the Anglican Communion in the modern world and to gain inspiration and power from this world-wide fellowship in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. One cannot overestimate the importance of this Congress to the Anglican Church as a whole and particularly to that part of it represented by our own Diocese of Toronto. Every parishioner will want to have a part (no matter how small) in helping to provide transportation and hospitality for those of far-away places where poverty is more the rule than the exception. You will be happy to know your Parish has budgeted an amount towards this and a further appeal will be made during Lent. Each Parish has now organized an Anglican Congress Committee and ours is the responsibility of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Rose. A report of this Committee is included in this booklet. Please read it carefully, be ready to support the committee when plans are completed, and above all pray for the guidance of God's Holy Spirit for those who bear the very great responsibility of world leadership in the Anglican Congress.

WARDENS' REPORT FOR 1962

To THE MEMBERS OF ST. JOHN'S CHURCH, WEST TORONTO:

Your Wardens are pleased to present the Financial Report herewith.

Total Receipts amounted to \$46,726.90, out of which all current expenses were paid.

The Parish House continues to serve a useful purpose. During the year we were able to pay a further \$5,500.00 off the principal of the demand loan (held by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce) as well as \$1,435.68 in interest. The loan now stands at \$22,000.00.

The members also contributed \$11,530.02 to objects outside the Parish, including a Mission Allotment of \$8,514.00 and \$500.00 to Diocesan Church Extension Fund.

The beautifying of the Church grounds, by landscaping, has been completed. This was made possible through a bequest of one of our former parishioners.

St. John's is extremely fortunate in having Rev. Gordon Philpotts and Rev. Mervyn Everall, who with their families, are contributing greatly to our Parish life. It has been a real privilege to serve the Church under their leadership.

We wish also to thank the staff for their wonderful assistance.

No report of St. John's would be complete if it did not include heartfelt thanks to our Organist, Mr. Percy MacDonald, and the Choir for the wonderful music they continue to render throughout the year, and to the Women's Guild for their financial assistance without which your Wardens' task would have been much more difficult.

To all the other organizations our thanks for making this past year so pleasant.

It has been a distinct honour to have served St. John's during 1962.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT

I am now well into the ninth month of my ministry with the people of St. John's Church and I wonder where the time has gone. The day is fast approaching when I shall be finished the sixth and final year of my course in Theology at Wycliffe College and can take my place in this parish on a full-time basis. The reason that the months have gone so fast is that I am required to spend much of my time at College taking lectures and writing assignments as well as carrying out a ministry in the parish. However, it has been a blessing to me and I find that I can better relate the required academic courses to the practical work of a parish. It is one thing to read about the way a Church School should function properly, or discuss the conduct of funerals, marriages etc., and another to do these things. Yet I do look forward, with eager anticipation, to that day in April when I shall graduate from Wycliffe, and that day in May when I shall be Ordained to the priesthood. Then I shall feel better qualified, both in time and ability, to give my full efforts to the great Christian need that is to be found here as in any other part of the Church.

The Rector has been very patient with me in these first awkward months of adjustment to a city-parish. His leadership and guidance have been invaluable to me and, I feel certain, to the people of St. John's Church.

My ministry during these initial months has been quite varied and, for the most part, gratifying. My first services of Marriage and Baptism came during the summer months when the Rector was away -- joyous occasions that will remain with me throughout the rest of my ministry. Unfortunately there have been many funerals, some 20 or more, that have out-numbered the happier occasions. One of the most rewarding tasks that has been assigned to me has been the conduct of Sunday Services at Runnymede Hospital on the third Lord's Day of each month. Most of the patients are shut-ins and appreciate any outside ministry that is made available to them. The simplified Service of Morning Prayer is conducted by myself, capably assisted by Misses Georgina Taylor and Edna Thompson, for about thirty women patients. I have made many visits to the other hospitals, both general and psychiatric, bringing the ministry of Christ to the sick. Last summer I was engaged in an extensive home visiting programme which took me to various areas of the parish but which had to be curtailed when I returned to College in September. This will be resumed in May of this year. I conducted the combined Vacation School of the Junction which was held at our church last July. It was here that I found real fellowship with the other clergy and laity of the neighbouring churches.

Mr. Philpotts has assigned to me the young people's work of the parish and for this I am most grateful. One of the happiest associations at St. John's has been the opportunity to work closely with the Church School, the Collegiate Club, and of course the ALPHA and OMEGA A.Y.P.A. members. I have always been concerned with the important place that our young people should be taking in the life of the Church. After all, they are the Church of the future and we must look to the future in these times of transition and change.

ADVISORY BOARD

The Advisory Board is the only Canonical committee in St. John's. The work of the Board is performed by its five committees: Missionary, Parish Life, Social Service and Stewardship. However, at its five meetings during 1962 (with an average of 23 attending) the Board heard detailed reports of the activities of these committees as well as reports from the Rector, the Assistant and other independent groups. The Wardens presented progressive financial statements so that the Board was kept informed on St. John's balance sheet.

At the Board's first meeting in February of '62, the Rector announced St. John's theme for the year -- "The Christian Family in the Family Church" -- and plans were launched for all committees to actively follow out this during the year. The Family Mission held in November under the sponsorship of the Advisory Board climaxed the year-long program of events. Led by Rt.Rev. William Wallace Davis, Co-adjutor Bishop of Nova Scotia, it was enthusiastically received and supported by the congregation and brought new zeal and vision to the Parish.

The Board approved the continuation of the Parish Newsletter and the Annual Report. A committee was approved to study the present zoning system in the Parish and to present a new plan of zoning and activity to be considered at the '63 Vestry Meeting.

PARISH LIFE COMMITTEE

Many phases of Parish activities were considered at the six meetings of the Committee in 1962, and some specific recommendations resulted.

Early in the year, the Christian Education Committee was incorporated into the Parish Life Committee. The Committee has subsequently recommended a change in Church School finance policy on a one-year trial basis. Proposed is a 50-50 split of income between Mission support and Church School expenses.

Support and co-operation were given by the Committee to such ventures as the Family Lenten evenings, the Parish picnic, and the Parish Mission.

All Church organizations are invited to voice questions, criticisms or suggestions regarding any area of Parish life through this Committee.

MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

Under the auspices of this Committee 300 Church Calendars were sold to members of our congregation. The Committee wishes to thank all who purchased this splendid Calendar, some buying extra copies as gifts for friends, relatives and Sunday School pupils.

In May, four members of our Committee attended an excellent conference at Aurora, on the Christian Approach to the Jewish People. Our two speakers were converted Jews - Rev. Gregory Baum, an Augustinian priest in the Roman Catholic Church, and Rev. Samuels, Secretary of the International Hebrew- Christian Alliance, a Baptist minister from England and also Mayor of his sea-port town. In part of Rev. Samuels talk he pointed out that Our Lord was a Jew, the Apostles were Jews, the New Testament was written by Jews, with the exception of St. Luke.

The Annual Missionary Night was held on Wednesday evening, October 10th, beginning with a dessert supper for all branches of St. John's W.A. Each President told of the work, aims, and problems of her group. The J.A. leader had her girls tell us their aims and work in graphic form. Our Rector added a great deal to our night and got some unexpected answers from the young people. At 8 p.m. the whole congregation had the opportunity of seeing a good film on the 1954 Congress and hearing Mr. W.A. Hand, Lay Executive Officer. Mr. Hand gave a vivid and enthusiastic account of the plans that are taking form.

Our Rector has asked the Missionary Committee to assume responsibility for the Anglican Congress in St. John's Parish. This group will be augmented by other interested members of our Congregation. We urge each member of our Church to study the "Church in the 60's" which will be used as a basis for the Anglican Congress 1963. Also, prayer can be offered that the Holy Spirit may guide the delegates and all of us. We have been chosen to be hosts for this great and memorable occasion, let us prepare ourselves to be good and knowledgable hosts.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The Property Committee held numerous meetings during 1962, and we can report that the following work was accomplished.

On instructions from the Women's Guild, new cupboards were installed in the alcove of the kitchen. This work was paid for by the Women's Guild.

Trouble was experienced with the outside lighting system. Mr. Willis consulted with the Canadian General Electric Company and was advised that we were using the wrong type of lens. A supply of tempered lens were left free of charge.

Previous to Mr. M. Everall's arrival, the Parish House apartment was inspected and found to be in poor condition, needing a thorough cleaning, painting, and a new floor in one of the bedrooms.

Mr. Howard Thompson undertook to lay plywood and Mr. George Mitchell laid a tile covering. Mrs. Black was engaged for two days to clean up the apartment, and Mr. Everall did the painting himself, the Church supplying the paint.

At the time that Mr. Legge was making changes in the exposed section of the great organ, some plastering and painting had to be done.

On May 12, 1962, Mr. H. Smith, Mr. J. Goodfellow and a number of members of the B.A.C. met with Mr. Lazda of the Parks Department and planted a number of shrubs and trees.

In May 1962, your Wardens advised the Property Committee to proceed with the work of plastering and re-decorating the bedrooms, halls and study in the Rectory. Also several places in the rooms in the Parish Hall needed plastering and painting. After obtaining competitive prices this work was done.

As a number of the tiles on the main hall floor and the men's washroom had lifted, the tile in the main hall was relaid and a new floor laid in the men's washroom.

A request was received from the Cheerio Unit concerning the cost of an iron railing for the Parish House steps. After obtaining competitive prices, the rail was installed and the cost was borne by the Cheerio Unit.

The Rectory garage was given a coat of white paint by Mr. J. Good-fellow.

The switch panel for the Church lighting has proven inadequate and another panel of switches will be installed.

An adequate heating system for the Vestry is planned. The Hydro was called and recommended three baseboard type heating units controlled with a wall thermostat.

The walls of the bathroom in Mr. Everall's apartment in the Parish House are in poor condition and the Property Committee have recommended to your Wardens that this work be proceeded with as soon as possible.

Our projects are varied. In March a food shower was held for the Downtown Church Workers and the Friendship Work. In October a toy shower was given for the Missionary bales. A yearly project is knitting and sewing for

Under the direction of the "W.C.E.", refreshments have been served on many occasions in the past year, and, at the time of the Family Mission the members of the Parish were telephoned by the women of our organizations, to remind them of the dates of the Mission.

In the Fall, our groups were happy to provide the sum of \$253.00 for a Theological Student Fund, and in December, Christmas cheer was given to four families in the Parish. Dinner, clothing and toys were provided. Christmas greetings were sent to 53 members of our Church who are "shut-ins".

Although this organization was started as an experiment, we feel that it has proven itself to be of valuable assistance to the Rector and Wardens, and we are looking forward to more accomplishments in the year 1963.

CHURCH SCHOOL

The past year our attendance has shown a decline and has been very disappointing. Our total enrollment has dropped to 148, while our largest attendance on any one Sunday reached 104, as against a total enrollment of 189 in 1961, with our largest attendance on any one Sunday reaching 136. With the whole-hearted support of all parents and members of our Parish, we believe the attendance of our Church School could be improved substantially.

With respect to the teaching staff, we started out the 1962-1963 school year with a strong and active staff of teachers. Due to resignations, sickness, etc., we now find ourselves in need of teachers. It is not unusual for both the Superintendent and Secretary to take classes without prior notice.

It will be noted from the Financial Statement, our position is down from last year. In order to stimulate the children's interest in Mission work, a policy of setting aside 50% of the collections, including the Lenten Boxes. for a specific Mission Project has been established. This will result in a deficit for the Church School finances. The Church Wardens have agreed to cover this deficit, in view of the fact the Church will receive credit for the Church School project on the Apportionment.

The Church Staff sincerely feel that their efforts to educate the children to become active members of the Church in the future is not as effective as we would like it to be. We ask the prayers and active support of all members of the congregation in helping us carry forward this most important part of the Church's work.
