

## WORDLESS SERMON

A churchman who had been attending services regularly stopped going. After a few weeks, the priest decided to visit his absent parishioner.


It was a chilly evening and the priest found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for the pastor's visit, the man welcomed him, led him to a big chair near the fireplace and waited. The priest made himself comfortable, but said nothing. In silence he contemplated the play of the flame around the burning legs. After some moments, he took the tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone. The host watched in quiet fascination as the lone ember's flame diminished. There was a momentary glow and then the fire was no more, soon it was cold and grey. Not a word had been spoken since the initial greeting.

Just before the priest was ready to leave, he picked up the cold, dead ember and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow once more with the light and warmth of the burning coals around it.

As the pastor reached the door to leave, his host said, "Thank you for your visit, especially for your 'firey' sermon. I shall be back in church next Sunday."

## THE EMPTY TOMB



Lent will soon be over. We are fast approaching Easter, the greatest day in history. On this day, sometimes called the Sunday of the Resurrection, we must abandon ourselves to joy. The Empty Tomb confirms the hopes of all mankind. For belief in immortality in some form is as universal as belief in God. The Resurrection of our Lord assures us that that form will be personal; not a shadowy disembodied spirit - not an absorption into the universal source of life - but the fulness of life, clothed upon with a spiritual body.

Let us be clear as to what the new life is not. It is not a return to the cld life under the old conditions, a recovery, a restoration, as with the widow's son Lazarus, and Jairus' daughter, who were restored to their old life. Nor is it an unwinding of the grave clothes, as with Lazarus.

Rather we believe it is a new form of life. We believe that the material, particles of which our Lord's bedy was composed, were resumed on the spiritual plane from which, in the beginning, matter had been precipitated. As no one saw the process which took place in that silent tomb, we can only use pious imagination to picture it. We may believe that at one moment the Body lay there beneath the grave clothes, and that then the clothes sank down on the rock untenanted. We are familiar with the transformation of matter.


Water under certain conditions changes form into ice, liquid, and evaporation - all the result of changes in the temperature. It is the same water under three different conditions. This, hewever, is on the material plane. Our Lord's body became a spiritual body; intensely real, but in all things ebedient to the spirit.

Mankind has knelt, gazing into the darkness of the tomb, and Love has asked: "Shall I ever see that dear face again; hear again that dear voice?" No answer has come from the silent Tomb until Easter Day.

Easter morning turned timid hopes into assured convictions. Life, triumphant, victorious, indestructible, rises with Christ from the Empty Tomb.

.... SPECIAL, Salta Argentina. This year has been a very difficult one for the Indian brethren on the river Pilcomayo, as there was so little fish ... and the people have really suffered from lack of food. However, we recently heard that there is some fish now, and that there is also an excellent crop of chanar and algarrobo beams (forest fruits), and that in the churches there is much praise to God for this provision of their needs. I know that the folk in Canada will be thrilled to hear this, ... Praise the Lord!

However, although the Lord is providing the "Bread for Today," we are deeply concerned about the worsening situation with regard to "Bread for Tomorrow." Recently there have been plans published for the Development and Colonisation of the Chaco where the indians live; and it is envisaged that the land (at the moment equivalent of Grown Lands) will be handed ever to new Colonizing groups, including South Africans and Rhodesians. We are gravely concerned that this will mean that our Indian brethren will be dispossessed of the land that is theirs by right, as they inhabited these lands even in the 15th century. We feel it right to take action on two counts:

- 1. Various entities have shown interest in the possibility of helping with grants, so that land can be parchased which would be held in trust for the Indians, thus giving them at least some areas where they had security of land tenure, and the possibility of development, without staying perpetually on the lowest rung of the ladder in Argentine society.
- 2. We are helping the brethren to form themselves into a limited company of which the sharehelders would all be Indians, thus giving them some legal standing.

You can imagine some of the dreadful headaches that such action and commitment to agricultural development and commercial involvement brings.

Here and There (cont'd.) ....

And yet we see this as a part of our obedience to the Lord who has called us to love our meighbour as ourself. How much easier life would be if we washed our hands of this whole business, but if we did we would be as guilty as Pontius Pilate.

"Carboncito", a large tract of land, was purchased by us last year with the purpose of giving land security and work opportunity to a group of Indians who lack both. The necessary infra-structure of buildings, water and services have now been established, and the first Indians will be moving on to this land to settle at the beginning of December. Just try to imagine what it will mean for people of different areas to come together to form themselves into a new community. At the centre of this will be the one entity that can truly unite them at the deepest level - the Church. Please pray for Juan Barrossa, and his wife Dominga, who will be the pastor of this naw group.



PRAYER "H" SHARE ....



There was a man of God named Elijah. He was, perhaps, one of the most outstanding of the prophets of all time. People refer to him as the prophet of fire. This man had a very intimate relationship with his God and consequently a power in prayer such as few attain. He prayed that there might be no rain and for three long years, there was no rain. He prayed again and there was torrential rain. He asked the Lord to show His power, that the children of Israel might know, without a shadow of a doubt. that He and not Baal was THE LORD. After pouring twelve barrels of water on the wood, sacrifice and altar, and filling the trench round about with water in obedience to the Word of the Lord, Elijah asked God to answer by fire. Before 450 prophets of Baal and 400 prophets of the groves and all the children of Israel, the fire of the Lord fell. So powerful was it that the wood and the sacrifice and even the stones of the altar and the dust and all the water were consumed. A man of God had learned the secret of prayer power.

imfortunately, all too few Christians have realized the potential power in prayer. Prayer power such as Elijah had, demands a price. The price is discipline. Everything wants to crowd out that time with God. How much time do we spend daily with God? Five minutes, ten minutes, half an hour, one hour? Jesus saids "Could ye not watch with me one hour?" ... ONE HOUR. Can we do it?

Why do we need to pray?
There are three major goals.

1. To glorify God. 2. To
have fellowship with Him. 3. To
focus on a lost world and a great
in-gathering of souls.

We often fail to realize that Satan and his demons have power to delay an answer — not to withhold it, but to <u>delay it</u>. It takes persistent and insistent prayer to battle against him until the answer comes.

Is the Church a praying Church? To what extent are we at St. John's a praying Church. Our power is measured by the depth of our prayer life. Can we mobilize ourselves and commit ourselves to one hour of prayer and study of the Word of God daily that the Lord's work may be powerful in this place? One straight hour may seem too much, perhaps four fifteen minute periods is easier to start.

Two excellent helps to a profitable Quiet Time are the Hible Reading Fellowship which can be ordered through Florrie Willis, 239-0153, and Scripture Union Daily Bread, which Edna Thompson, 769-8343, will be glad to get for you. Resolve to discipline yourself and become a prayer warrior for Jesus Christ. He is counting on Christians to pray in His Kingdom.





# THE LITANY AND PENTENTIAL SERVICE

The Litany (page 30) is the oldest service in the Prayer Book. It was authorized for use in the Church of England in 1544, five years before the first Prayer Book was issued. Thomas Cranmer, then Archbishop of Ganterbury, and chief author of the Prayer Book, combined the best elements of the usages of the Church of Rome, the Eastern Orthodox Church, and the Latheran Church.

The form of a Litany (responsive biddings and petitions) was used by Jews and pagans in ancient times, and was adopted by the Christian Church in the 4th Century. It is recorded in historical writings that the first service conducted by St. Augustine after his arrival in Britain in 597 was a Litany in procession through the streets of Camterbury.

The Litary differs from the other services of the Church, because it is said or sung from a prayer desk in the Nave. Since it is a penitential service, the minister joins the people, to show that he, too, needs to ask for forgiveness of his sins. This position was also based on the many of the ancient Hebrews (Joel II:17).

The Litany consists of five parts. It begins with a series of invocations to the Trinity (separately and collectively),

which remind us that all prayer should begin with adoration. The second part is known as "D "Deprecations", in which we ask that we be saved from all evil, through the redemptive power of our Lord. The third, and longest, part is the "Intercessions", in which we ask for all manner of things for ourselves and others. The fourth part is the concluding prayers with which we usually finish the service. The fifth part is "A Supplication", a series of responses and p ayers of a very penitential nature, for specific use in time of trouble.

On page 611 of the Prayer Book, we find "A Penitential Service", which is usually used on Ash Wednesday, either by itself or in combination with other services. The service begins with saveral sentences from the Bible which advocate repentance and assure forgiveness. These are followed by an exhortation which gives historical background and invites us to observe Lent. A lesson from Joel 2: 12-18 is followed by a psalm led by the priest at a prayer desk in the nave. Several prayers, versicles and responses of a penitential nature complete the service.



MORE-WITH-LESS COOKBOOK - by Doris Janzen Longacre

This season of Lent, the emphasis is on food and its place in world development. We are urged to eat more responsibly, in a more "ferial" way, leaving the "fistal" eating to great occasions.

This cookbook contains many ideas for doing that, and, in the process, cutting the ever-rising grocery bills.

Although meat recipes are not completely cut out of the book, as it is a valuable source of protein, less expensive ways of using proper amounts of it are suggested and increased use is made of soups, beans, cheese, and vegetables.

The book was commissioned by the Mennonite Central Committee, in response to world food needs. It is available at the Anglican Fook Centre.

THE FABULOUS SKINNIE MINNIE RECIPE BOOK - by Frances Hunter

Here is another recipe book advocating the use of fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, and fresh ways of cooking them along with chicken and fish.

Frances Hunter says cooking is fum ... losing weight can be fum ... and keeping it off can be fum. It all depends upon your attitude.

This book is not only full of low calorie main dishes, and desserts ... it has sample menus also. Here's low-cal punch that sounds good:

# CHANGE FLAVORED PUNCH

1 qt. diet iced tea

l qt. low-cal cranberry juice

1 qt. unsweetened orange juice 32 oz. ginger ale or similar

Makes one gallon punch, 52 calories per 8 oz. serving.

## COOKED SALAD DRESSING

1/2 cup cider vinegar

3 egg yolks

t tsp. prepared mustard

tsp. salt

tsp. cayenne pepper or onion powder

Heat vinegar to boiling in small pan. In top of double boiler beat egg yolks with seasons until thick. Pour hot vinegar slowly over, stir weal. Cook in double boiler until thick.

Scoutmaster Don Heoper is in charge along with Area Scouters.




