



He points out that Christ never went out of His way to help people. He simply helped people in His path; and the best witnessing for Christ that we can do is by "listening with real interest."

At this Easter Season, I would like to share with you a true story from the animal kingdom. Early in February, one of the family pets at the Rectory, "Blaze", contracted spinalitis. His general condition worsened until he suffered a stroke and had to be put to sleep on February 24, a bleak day in the Rectory. When my brother and sister-in-law in Vancouver heard about it, Sister-in-law Doreen wrote the following letter which I am sure she would not mind sharing with all of you:

# "Andy's Legacy"

Andy came to live at our house on Melbourne Street when she was two years old. She had belonged to two men who spoiled her thoroughly and by the time she came to live with us she just naturally considered that chesterfields and beds were made for dogs.

When I first saw her I thought she was the funniest looking dog that I had ever seen. She was an English Setter, white with black blotches - all energy and a totally endearing soul. We all grew so very fond of her and of course as I was always home with her, she became my dog with the exception of Karen on whose bed she deigned to sleep each night.

When I became a widow I had to go to work and of course, Andy had to stay alone in the house all day. This must have been very difficult for her after having so much freedom all her life. During this time Karen was very lonely and Andy became her special friend.

After I met Arthur and we decided to marry, I told Karen that we would not be able to have Andy with us at the new house as she was so large and bouncy and Arthur had never had a dog and did not understand about them. I also told her that I had contacted Aunty

Jean and she was happy to have Andy in the country. Karen said nothing but just went into her room and shut her door. The next day she came to me and said that much as she loved and adored Andy she realized that this marriage was more important and she was willing to give her to Aunty Jean. This was such a mature decision as at this point Karen was a very emotionally mixed up girl of 14.

Arthur and I were married in August and in October we went to visit Jean. There was Andy, so pleased to see us but well adjusted to her new life and enjoying herself with their other dog. Each morning the two animals would do their rounds of the neighbourhood and in the home Jean's children would make a great fuss over hood and in the home Jean's children would make a great fuss over her. While we were there I was in the kitchen one day and Jean was over by the sink; Andy started her 'oo oo' noise that she had always made when she wanted me to give her a biscuit. Jean immediately reached down and pulæed out a box of biscuits and gave her one — Andy looked over to me as much as to say, "See, I can con her just like I did you"!

One night in November I was asleep in bed and I woke up sobbing and sobbing - Arthur wakened and wondered what had happened. I said that Andy had died and had come to say goodbye to me. It was all so real that the next day I wondered if I should phone Jean but decided to wait and thought that no doubt she would write to me if anything had occurred. Her following letters did not contain any news of Andy and I put the incident out of my mind.

Finally in January a letter arrived from Jean in which she said that they had had to have Andy put to sleep as one of the lumps she had had, ruptured and the Vet felt that it was the end. Karen was heartbroken and shut herself in her room and wouldn't have anything to do with me. That night when Arthur came home I told him what had happened and he went out and bought Karen a box of chocolates and took them in to her. He stayed and talked to her for some time and this was a first for them as their relationship had been most remote. When she finally came out in the morning she was still sad but was now able to cope with her grief.


Later Arthur said, "You know, this new relationship I have with Karen is Andy's legacy"!

Recently Charles Templeton wrote a book imagining what would happen should the bones of Jesus be found. Would it make any difference? Paul thought it would. "If Christ be not raised", he said, "your faith is vain: ye are yet in your sins."

I Cor. 15:17

Why would our faith be vain?

My feet--to go or stay as you entreat?


That two edged sword, Lord, Why did you let them pierce your naked side? Was it that I might learn to yield to You That ever at Your side I might abide?


That awful cross, Lord,

Give You my sin and live eternally?


The borrowed tomb, Lord,

# PRAYER 'N' SHARE ....

And Jesus said "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." - Luke 23:34.

Three crosses were set upon a hill outside the city gate of Jerusalem. A small crowd gathered. With breaking hearts they watched Roman soldiers nail their beloved master, Jesus Christ, to a cross between two thieves. Later they heard His words of forgiveness: "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do."

There are many lessons to be learned as I contemplate the meaning of Good Friday. What is the spiritual significance of this day? Is it not the final and complete crossing out of the human self that demands its own way? Is it not allowing the Christ to take full possession?




CHRISTIAN EDUCATION ....

Baptism, Catechism and Confirmation

This month's article has to do with becoming a member of the Church, God's family.

It is fitting that the service in which we celebrate the enlargement of God's family - our spiritual family - is a sacrament. Baptism, while not given to us by Christ's express command, as Communion was, is based on Christ's example and that of the earliest Church. The beginning of Christ's ministry is marked by his baptism in the Jordan; the beginning of the Church, at Pentecost, is marked by Peter telling the converts, "Repent and be baptized."



The service of Baptism, as is currently used, is divided into several parts. It is often used in conjunction with Morning Prayer, and, in some congregations, with Communion. As it appears in our Prayer Book, it is written first for children, then for those able to answer for themselves; in the English form which we have been using, one version is used for both. In all instances, rubrics tell us that it is to be, whenever possible, at the principal service of the day.

The Prayer Book version of the service for children, on which the others are based, begins with prayers that God will make the child fit for baptism, and will guard the child throughout his life. The congregation is also included in the prayers, as the requester of baptism for the child. The gospel precedent for receiving children into the church is read, followed by a prayer placing the child into the gospel context, and then by an invocation of the Holy Spirit.

The Promises then follow. After the congregation recitation of the Apostles' Creed, the Sponsors, on behalf of the child, affirm belief in the faith outlined by the Creed, affirm the desire for baptism, and promise to live a Christian life. This section of the service concludes with prayers that the child may do those things which were promised for him.

Christian Education (Con't.) ....

The water is then blessed, set aside for its sacred use, and the child is given his Christian name. He is dipped into or sprinkled with the water, and presented to the congregation to be received by them. Prayers of thanksgiving and the Lord's Prayer then follow. The priest then reminds the parents and sponsors of the duties they have undertaken for the child, and the service concludes with prayers for the child's home and for a healthy childhood, ending with the

The traditional use of the Catechism is as a preparation for Confirmation, but it is structured like a service and may be used The Catechism sets out, in quesiton-and-answer form, all the teachings of the Church. It traces the student's life, from his baptism, through his belief (the Apostle's Creed), his lifestyle (the Commandments), and his spiritual life (the Lord's Prayer and Communion). As a preparation for Confirmation, it reminds the student what was promised for him (or what he promised) at baptism, and what the Lord did in the baptismal sacrament. Following the Catechism is a supplementary instruction on the nature of the Church, to make the picture complete.

The "end" of Catechism is Confirmation. This is a service which derives from baptism, but cannot be said to complete it. Unlike baptism, it is not a sacrament, although it is often linked with Communion, which is. It requires a bishop, who, in the tradition of the Apostles, lays hands on the candidate for strengthening (making firm in faith) by the Holy Spirit who was received in baptism.

The service has a scriptural precedent, and several of these are read. Baptismal vows are renewed, and hands are then laid on each candidate in turn, with prayer for strengthening by the Holy Spirit. The Lord's Prayer, prayers for the candidates and congregation, and the blessing, conclude the service.

It is easy to say what Confirmation is not, but requires some thought to say what it is. In Confirmation we are given new strength. To me, at least, one of the most important things it is, or should be, is a gateway to confident Christian living.


ACROSS THE MILES ....

Meet JOYCE GATONGA - our new little girl in Kenya.

Joyce, a boarding student for ten months of the year at the Materi Girls Centre in Meru, Kenya, has completed four years of primary school and is just beginning Class V.

Her father, Gituma (age 50) and her mother, Elizabeth (age 40) farm, and there are four brothers and two sisters yet at home.

Joyce lives in one of Kenya's most undeveloped and poorest of regions. The area called Tharaka - which leads towards the Indian Ocean. The telephone, a glass of clean water and a doctor are still 'miracles' of the future for Tharaka.



Since Joyce's parents are extremely poor, she will need some assistance with tuition and boarding costs which have been kept to the minimum. However, in a place like Tharaka, even \$20.00 can be a villager's income for up to two months.

At home the girl lives in a mud hut without running water or electricity. Both parents are simple farmers (millet and cow-peas) What is grown is eaten at home.


