Dear Friends,

With the sudden announcement of Father Robert Hagler's resignation as Incumbent, I suspect that many of you are experiencing a great deal of sadness and perhaps even some anger at his departure. Such feelings are quite normal when a warm, trusting relationship has developed between priest and people. In a sense one experiences similar feelings with the death of a loved one. It may be important that you share your feelings with a trusted family member or friend in order that healing takes place. I understand completely what is happening.

I have asked the Reverend Bruce Alton, who is known to many of you as a caring pastor, to be Priest-in-Charge until the end of August when his own academic programme resumes. I shall be appointing a similar person to be responsible for ministry as the interim continues. I have asked the Parish Selection Committee to begin gathering information regarding your expectations of your future Incumbent and will meet with them in September to hear the results.

During the next few months as we move together towards the selection of a new Incumbent please be assured of my concern, together with the advice and counsel of my Regional Dean for Toronto West, the Reverend Neville Bishop. The loss of a trusted friend surfaces mixed feelings which are often bewildering and disturbing. Yet, as we work together in the days and months ahead, a new and exciting chapter in the life of St. John's will unfold. Under the guidance of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, we journey together.



ME AND CHRISTIAN EDUCATION
BY
LYNDON HUTCHISON-HOUNSELL

I never know what to say about myself. Well, I was born in Brookfield, Newfoundland 26 years ago. I was brought to Ontario by my parents when I was 17 months old and we've lived here ever since. I don't remember much of the first four years, I do remember going to Sunday school in a grey wooden structure and that it smelled like a forest, a damp wooden smell. I grew up just west of here in Georgetown. It's a great little place that is getting bigger like all around southern Ontario. I grew up going to school and going to church.

When I was 17 years old I went to the Niagara Youth Conference. It was here that I discovered I was not the only 17 year old who still wanted to go to church. I learned what true trusting community was and I began thinking about making a living at this church stuff. In the next couple of years I got into acting and singing and dancing in musicals and I went off to retreats to explore my faith.

Then I went off to the University of Waterloo to pursue Civil Engineering since my highest marks were in math and science. I quickly discovered this was not what God was wanting me to do or so I interpreted my dislike of engineering. I switched to studying philosophy and mediaeval studies for the next three years while ministering to my fellow students and working with the university chaplains. From January to April of 1987 I studied for four months in Israel and the West Bank. This was a time of exploring the Bible from historical, cultural, geographical, archaeological, and religious points of view. It was great to become aware of the past as well as the present situation in this part of our world. Most of all it was great to meet the people.

After and during my time in Waterloo I spent time working in various jobs getting to know people with different lifestyles. During this time became a postulant for the diocese of Niagara and I am still so.

I have since completed two years of the M. Div. program at Trinity College and I am presently studying music for one year while I commune here at St. John's. I have spent a great deal of time studying community structure in academic and practical ways. Out of this I have grown to understand my calling to the ordained ministry as a call, a need and a desire to build community through pastoral relationship and worship together. I have been trying to combine these two by exploring pastoral liturgy. This is to mean that liturgy should fulfil some of our spiritual needs as well as challenge thus to fulfil the various needs of the rest of the world. I hope to develop this awareness as Christian Education Coordinator. I hope this year is a pastoral liturgical year aimed at building relationships and community with all of God's creation, including the lilies of the field and the birds of the air.

God be with us all as we start out with our new curriculum, "The Whole People of God", in the hope that we may learn to be a loving, just, and merciful people in this world that God has given us.

Motherhood: The Second Oldest Profession

Most women become mothers by accident, some by choice, a few by social pressures and a couple by habit.

This year nearly 100,000 women will become mothers of handicapped children. Did you ever wonder how these mothers are chosen?

Somehow I visualize God hovering over Earth selecting his instruments for propagation with great care and deliberation. As He observes He instructs his angels to take notes in a giant ledger.

"Armstrong, Beth: son, Patron saint-Matthew.

Forest, Marjorie: daughter, Patron saint, Cecilia.

Rutledge, Carrie: twins, Patron saint - give her Gerard. He's used to profanity."

Finally, He passes a name to an angel and smiles, Give her a handicapped child."

The angel is curious. "Why this one, God? She's so happy."

"Exactly. Could I give a handicapped child a mother who doesn't know laughter? That would be cruel.

"But does she have patience?" asks the angel.

"I don't want her to have too much patience, or she'll drown in a sea of self-pity and despair. Once the shock and resentment wear off, she'll handle it. I watched her today. She has the sense of self and independence so rare and so necessary in a mother. You see, the child I'm going to give her has his own world. She has to make it live in her world, and that's not going to be easy."

"But Lord, I don't think she even believes in you."

God smiles, "No matter, I can fix that. This one is perfect. She has just enough selfishness."

The angel gasps, "Selfishness? Is that a virtue?"

God nods, "If she can't separate herself from the child occasionally, she'll never survive. Yes, here is a woman who I will bless with a child less than perfect. She doesn't realize it yet, but she is to be envied.

She will never take for granted a spoken word. She will never consider a step ordinary. When her child says "Mamma" for the first time, she will be witness to a miracle and know it. When she describes a tree or a sunset to her blind child, she will see it as few people ever see my creations.

I will permit her to see clearly the things I see - ignorance, cruelty, prejudice - and allow her to rise above them. She will never be alone. I will be at her side every minute of every day of her life because she is doing my work as surely as she is here by my side."

"And what about her patron saint? asks the angel, his pen poised in mid air.

God smiles. "A mirror will suffice."

One of the great difficulties
most Christians face today is the
eroding of faith by the constant
influence of worldly ways. We are
bombarded with advertising, songs,
papers, magazines, books,
programmes on radio and television
containing and expounding ideas
that are a long way from Christ
and his teaching.


Since our life in the social community is so influenced
by secular input, how much nourishment does our faith
receive? If we are only nourished by our Sunday celebration,
we may be in danger of spiritual malnutrition. A person who
wants to be a strong, positive Christian needs to drink
everyday at the fountain of scripture and prayer. If as a
Christian community and as individuals we want to grow in
grace then we must strengthen our prayer by our meditation
and reading of scripture, especially the Gospels. Through
daily Bible reading we open our hearts to the Spirit and
become more ready to listen to his guidance, to think about
the things of God, and to let God's will and ways influence
ours.

Bible reading, however, must be approached in a somewhat
different way than other reading we might do. Most of our
reading is done for information or entertainment but,
Bible reading is for us, a form of communion with God.
Information is imparted to us as well, but we intend, rather,
through Scripture to love God more and to draw closer to
Jesus.

Since Bible reading is a different kind of reading, we
should begin with prayer to the Holy Spirit, asking him to
help us by opening our hearts and our lives to his action. A
short prayer might be: "Lord, open my heart; let your Spirit
speak to me as I read your word." We should read slowly and
carefully, not trying to rush through a great number of
pages. As we go along, we should pause often and talk to our
Lord Jesus: "Lord, help me to understand what you are
telling me in this story". Often he speaks directly to us in
his dialogue. Sometimes we can take the words of others and
make them our own: "Lord, I believe! Help thou, mine
unbelief." or, "Lord, be merciful to me a sinner."

As we read slowly and carefully, we ask him to help us
know his will for us and for our community. We make short
prayers of love, prayers of mercy, grace, forgiveness. We
may pray for the needs of others, for world leaders, for all,
because Jesus died to save them.

At the end of your prayerful reading (and the passage
should not be too long) we should pause and thank God for his
help, and ask his strength to live his way. Such a prayer
might be: "Father, I thank you for speaking to me today
through your holy word".
