

### MEET GARY VAN DER MEER

We weren't sure whether we could get anything but dry facts into this edition of the Journal about our new Incumbent. Fortunately, Gary found an unexpected block of time in his busy summer schedule to have a chat with Bruce Alton. What follows is not a verbatim interview, but a reconstruction of some of their conversation we thought parishioners might like to read in getting to know Gary.

B.A. I'm glad you found some time to talk to me, and perhaps through me to some of the parish. You're on vacation [mid-July to mid-August], and you're just back from a Toronto-Montreal bicycle race. Did you beat the pack back just to talk with me?

Gary (laughing): Well, it wasn't a race. It was the Toronto - Montreal Bike Rally for the Toronto People with AIDS Foundation. I have had the great privilege of sharing for the second time in an incredibly satisfying experience; this year I am one of 110 cyclists who collectively raised over \$300,000 for the work of this organization. But the reason I'm able to visit you today is that I have just had the good fortune of finding an apartment in Toronto! It's in the Roncesvalles Village, a healthy walk or bike ride to the Church through High Park. My dog will like that! The rent is a lot more than in Port Perry, but ...


B.A.: Welcome to West Torontol Or, rather, I guess I should say welcome back.

Gary: Yes, in a way. I was on a field placement here at St. John's in my first year at seminary [Trinity College] back in 1989-90. Fr. Robert Hagler asked me to be a companion to two developmentally handicapped members in a group home. I brought them to church every week, integrated them into the worship, visited many parishioners with them, and prepared them for baptism at the Easter Vigil.

B.A.: I remember you from those days. So this is like returning home? To Toronto, to St. John's?

Gary: That's a hard question. My home? Well, I've lived in several places ...

B.A.: Tell me about that.



Gary: I'm originally from eastern Ontario, from Brockville. I attended U. of T., and lived in Toronto for over 11 years. But I have also worked at summer jobs in Holland (part of discovering my roots), and in Chicoutimi (part of becoming fluent in French). I've had church placements in Burlington, and in the Diocese of Cariboo, where I did my parish internship in 3 small churches north of Kamloops. I was ordained in the Diocese of Toronto, and went to Orillia, and then Port Perry, of course, where I've been for the past five and a half years.

B.A.: Are your parents Dutch Anglicans?

Gary: No, my parents are Canadian, at least they came to Canada in their teens, with their families, and the Dutch Reformed Church is my church background. My parents wanted us to have a wider less ethnic experience of being Canadian, and in my teenage years we went to the Presbyterian Church. Then when I went to the University of Toronto, studying history, I learned about the Reformation in Europe and in England. Peter Richardson — a friend of yours — taught a course on the English Reformation period. He emphasized something he called an "ethos of comprehensiveness of diversity" - people who have different theological outlooks and different worship preferences agreeing to make a home together in one church. I thought "finally this makes sense." When I was ready to explore getting involved in church, rather than just studying it from a distance, I remembered his comments and gravitated towards Anglican churches. I ended up at St. Thomas' Church on Huron Street, all excited about refugees and social change and justice and making the world a

better place.

B.A.: And lots of incense and ... liturgical processions, and so on?

Gary: Sure. "Smells and bells," as they say. That part of it seemed odd to me, but the living out of it was right on, and my reformed roots had to give way! I think as a result I have a greater appreciation for movement and drama as an expression of faith. I first encountered the B.A.S. in Confirmation class there, and after reading the introduction I was sold on it. More scope for drama and action, more room for lay participation, and we pray in the language in which we live.

**B.A.**: So you went to seminary to be a B.A.S. priest.

Gary: I wish it were that simple! (No, actually, I don't). I worked in the business world for a couple of years. Insurance. Stock brokerage firm. After I entered the M.B.A. program at York University in 1988, I found myself questioning the "me-first" priorities. I wanted to test the assumptions and values of the market place, but quickly turned to challenging them and looking at the ways in which non-profit organizations (like the Church) could meet the demands of the market and yet remain faithful to their own values.

B.A.: That's a tall order; maybe "the" issue for the church in the so-called "first-world."

Gary: I think so. And at the same time, I began to explore the possibility of ordination in the Anglican Church. The next year, in 1989, I started to do theological studies at Trinity College, concurrently with my business studies at York.


B.A.: With a view to a parish priest on Bay street?

Gary (laughing): No! But you've put your finger on one thing we've talked about — my relationship with the city of Toronto. Toronto is where many of my friends and family live now — it has been my home away from home for the eight years that I have been away. Coming back is a natural step. Toronto is also an interesting place in which to experience how Canadian values are challenged and rethought. I've experienced something of rural and small town Canada, and I have loved it. But here I am, and glad to be back. I read that

St. John's would be searching for a new incumbent, I submitted my name for consideration right away. I felt "at home" here quickly back in 1989, and I was sure I would quickly feel that way again. St. John's liturgy, at least as I remember it, is also home to me.

**B.A.**: And what about St. John's? What do you foresee here?

Gary: Oh, it's much too early for me to say where I think the parish should be heading (though I have some ideas)! I plan to do a lot of visiting, listening and learning over the next few months. I look forward to meeting everyone - I understand St. John's to be a community that is rich in diversity and talent. You already have a long story of discerning how to be faithful to the gospel, now it is time for us to figure out together to what future God is calling us.

## MAKING A JOYFUL HOISE UNTO THE LORD

One of the "perks" of working in academia is the healthy vacations which are offered to allow faculty to recharge. What my friends and business associates can't quite seem to understand is that my holidays cannot be taken during the summer because Sheridan College operates on a trimester system, that is three terms over 12 months, and the graduating class takes its last courses during the summer term.

At the moment I have a two-week break before the fall term begins. Enough time to mark projects from the last term and prepare some lesson plans for the next.

Similarly at St. John's there has been no down time, with weekly worship, preparations for the arrival of our new Incumbent, planning for the 2001/2002 Music at St. John's—Concerts with a Cause series, and choosing repertoire for the choir to tackle during the fall.

Over the past two years, I have been on the organizing Committee for the Toronto Organ Festival which took place July 8th through 12th. This is an event that is hosted by a different Canadian city each year, and this year featured a roster of international performers playing many of Toronto's great organs. It is slated to return to Toronto next in the year 2009. Because of my teaching I couldn't take in the whole event, but I did participate as I was able. A highlight of the event, for me, was a number of workshops with the Rev. Dr. Marva Dawn. Dr. Dawn, a theologian and musician, has written extensively on the theology of worship in our time and on the subject of "being" the Church in a consumer society. (Dr. Dawn will be participating in a symposium at Wycliffe College next spring-I would like to see a group from St. John's attend some of this event.)

Another project of mine has been the publication of a book, *The Organs of Toronto*, which is scheduled to be printed in the fall. I have been working on this publication with Alan Jackson, who did much of the work associated with our replacement console and is the "dean" of local organ builders. Alan has provided technical and

historical descriptions of some 38 organs, and I have provided an architectural context for each these instruments, and sometimes a smattering of social history as well.

This richly illustrated publication will highlight the instruments featured during the Toronto Organ Festival as well as an additional thirteen organs of special interest—some for historical value and some in order that as many different organ builders as possible might be represented. On this last account I have been able to include the organ of St. John's Church, West Toronto. Photographers are slated to be to the church over the coming weeks, if we can get some light onto the organ for their work!

Hopefully you will be reading this article wanting to put some "musical" dates in your fall calendar. Here are a few to record:

Wednesday, September 5<sup>th</sup>, 8:00 to 9:30 p.m. — Choir Rehearsals recommence. Note the change of evening from Tuesday (by popular demand). New members welcome (just speak with me)! Enter the church using the door at the end of the driveway. Unfortunately we still don't have any lights in the chancel, so we will be having the piano moved to an area of the church where light is to be found (likely the baptistery area)

Sunday, September 16<sup>th</sup> — Homecoming Service, will be the first occasion when the choir will be contributing to worship this fall. The choir will also be singing for the induction of Rev. Gary van der Meer on Thursday, September 27<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 p.m.

Saturday, October 20<sup>th</sup> at 8:00 p.m. —
First concert of the 2001/2002 season for our Music at St. John's — Concerts with a Cause — series featuring folk singer Susan Hookong. <u>Volunteers are needed</u> to assist with this concert and others in the series.


#### Girl Guides at St. John's

# Discuss the Questions of Life Over Dinner (or Breakfast) This Fall!

Alpha is a contemporary and practical introduction to the Christian Faith for adults. 
#### Urban Issues Forum


