

DASHING FEATS TURN DEFEAT INTO VICTORY

Officers Organize Men Under
Withering Fire and Hurl
Back Attackers.

With the Canadian Forces, Oct. 31.—Here are more tales of personal heroism during the battle of Cambrai:

A lieutenant of a Nova Scotia regiment, finding the advance of his brigade held up by heavy machine gun fire on both flanks and the thick uncut wire still before the enemy trenches, crawled forward alone through a hail of fire. He found a small gap and through this he led his men, organizing bombing parties. The enemy counter-attacked in force, and running short of bombs the company found itself in a critical situation. Although wounded in the head the lieutenant went back alone to our attacking line, and, gathering from company to company, gathered a supply of bombs. He received a slight wound in the side during the trip. On his return he found but a mere handful of men, but immediately organized them and, then, clearing the system himself, killing eleven and taking twenty-five prisoners. He steadfastly refused to be evacuated, remaining with the company for two days, until badly wounded in the back and gassed, when he was ordered out by senior officers. He made his report and then collapsed.

In the same battle a captain of a light infantry regiment assumed command of a battalion, when the senior officers became casualties. Tillot on September 30, when three companies on the left were badly disorganized, and were even beginning to withdraw from positions so hardly won. He went forward, rallying men at this critical juncture and succeeded in penetrating to their objectives. It was entirely due to his magnificent work that part of Tillot remained in our hands on that day.

A captain of a mounted rifle battalion, when his men were being cut down by machine gun fire, although wounded, dashed forward alone into an enemy machine gun nest and, armed with only rifle and bayonet, killed four of his men and prisoners. He then, with eight other men, under a withering fire, organized a party to fill in the gap on the flank and reinforced the troops attacking Tillot. His magnificent bravery and heroic leadership turned an imminent defeat into victory.

"FLU" VACCINE POPULAR

52 Pints Have Been Distributed by
the Provincial Health Dept.
Throughout Ontario.

Although it is too soon to state the merits of the new "flu vaccine," it is evident that Ontario intends to give it a fair trial. According to Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, secretary and chief officer of health for Ontario, some 30 litres, or roughly 52 pints, have been distributed throughout the province.

"We have endeavored to distribute it as fairly as possible," said Dr. McCullough. "We have supplied it to the medical officers of health, to hospitals and to the troops."

"How much has been used by Toronto?" asked The Star. "I cannot say, but I know that many private physicians are using it in the city. It is too early to know what results have been achieved by its use."

NOTIFY, MILITIA DEPT.

Teuton Papers Growing Bolder in Suggesting That the Kaiser Quit

London, Oct. 31.—An Amsterdam despatch says the Austrian censor permitted the Arbeiter Zeitung to publish a leading editorial article violently denouncing the "puny" German Kaiser, "who preferred to see bitter humiliation inflicted on his people rather than abdicate."

The Frankfurter Zeitung said: "It is quite clear the people would have been thankful if, in the radical change

in the home and foreign policy now begun, Emperor William had drawn personal consequences from those changes, especially for his own sake. He has made himself a symbol of the old regime."

The Kaiser is quoted in another despatch as having said to a number of members of the Reichstag: "If the moment comes when the interests of Germany demand it, I should abdicate without hesitation. But the moment does not seem to have come."

WILL DRAWN IN 1894 CANNOT BE FOLLOWED

Estate of Edward Allen, Worth
\$16,091, Goes to Widow
and Three Daughters.

Very little of the property distributed by the late Edward Allen in his will drawn in 1894 is now a part of his estate, so his assets of \$16,091 are to be distributed one-third to his widow and the balance among three daughters. He died in Toronto on October 22.

The bulk of the estate is composed as follows: Life insurance, \$5,000; securities for money, \$6,128; cash in bank, \$3,635, and real estate, \$650.

Jane Graham.

Securities for cash, \$3,613, and property at \$3,750, Carlton street, comprise the bulk of the \$8,263 estate of the late Jane Graham, who died August 6. By the terms of her will, dated October 6, 1914, \$800 is bequeathed to Jane Mary Graham, of Toronto, upon her attaining the age of 21. To her brother, Geo. Hodgins she left \$800, and to Mrs. Jean Isabella Hodgins, sister-in-law, \$200. Mabel Hodgins, London, a niece, is to receive \$300, after which deceased's son, Walter Graham, receives the balance.

Henry W. Welch.

The whole of the \$4,901 estate of the late Henry W. Welch, who died August 27, goes to his widow, Cecilia, his son, a beneficiary under the will, having predeceased him. The estate is made up of life insurance, \$3,000; book debts, \$1,160; cash in bank, \$295; personals, \$395.

Walter T. Ham.

The \$2,500 estate of the late Walter T. Ham, who died intestate October 22, is made up of \$1,000 life insurance and equity in 11 Leeds avenue, \$1,500. His widow and two infant children inherit.

Thomas Hart.

The bulk of the \$2,160 estate of the late Thomas Hart is represented in life insurance, \$1,105; household goods are included at \$700, and property at Coldwater, \$300. His widow and five granddaughters inherit, and a grandson receives a Geo. Clendenning.

The \$1,048 estate of the late Geo. Clendenning, who died intestate June 6, is composed for the most part of five acres of Markham, property worth \$700, and \$240 cash in the bank. Darius, of Markham, and Alice Harrington and Bertha Voden, of Markham, son and daughters, inherit.

Wm. Wright.

Pte. William Wright, who was killed in action Oct. 8, 1916, left a \$750 estate to his mother. It is composed of Lot 17 on the north side of Alexandra Blvd.

Mary McGarry.

John McGarry, husband, and Gerold, son, inherit the \$650 estate of the late Mary McGarry, who died intestate Oct. 16. Of the total \$500 is represented in cash in the bank.

SERBS REACH THE DANUBE

Cavalry Are Only 22 Miles South-East of Their Former Capital.

Paris, Oct. 31.—Serbian cavalry has reached the Danube east of Semendria (22 miles south-east of Belgrade), and has occupied Pozarebats (ten miles east of Semendria), said last night's official report.

"The Serbians have reached the front of Milanovatz, Torla and Palanka, sixty kilometers (thirty-five miles) south of Belgrade, capturing additional prisoners and material."

Russ Revolution Haunts Kaiserin

WINS MORAL VICTORY, BUT LOSES EXPENSES

Man Travels Far, Brings Witnesses Along, to Prove Case of Mistaken Identity.

Port Credit, Oct. 31.—Mr. I. Berry, of Blackheath, Ont., travelled nearly 65 miles yesterday to attend the Port Credit Motor Court yesterday, and brought three witnesses with him to prove that he had not been on the highway on the date the summons accused him of speeding. He informed Magistrate Gordon that yesterday was the first time he had been over the road. So convincing was his evidence that the magistrate did not hesitate in dismissing the case. But when Mr. Berry asked if he should not have some expense money for coming such a long distance, especially as he and all the witnesses had left their business to give evidence, Mr. Gordon said that the court could not make out an order to give him expenses.

"You could apply to the Highway Commission," he said.

"But why was I summoned?" asked Mr. Berry.

"It may have been a mistake in stenography, or the department may have given the wrong number. It is quite evident it was a mistake," answered the magistrate.

"The law doesn't compel him to come here," said Constable Henry. So after spending a whole day, using up several gallons of gasoline, and bringing three witnesses from his business, Mr. Berry returned home without any assurance that he would receive remuneration for his trip.

Mr. W. Williams, of 44 Cloverdale road, Toronto, sprang a new one on the court when he said that he kept track of the time it took him to pass through every municipality on the highway. In response to Constable Hunter's statement that he was travelling 23 miles an hour through Port Credit he produced his little book, which showed it took him just nine minutes and three seconds to pass through the town, or at the rate of 14 miles an hour. When assessed \$10 and costs he said he would appeal.

There were 61 cases on the rostrum yesterday.

Mayor Is Satisfied.

Mayor Church expressed the greatest satisfaction over the showing made by the Ontario Hydro Commission, as indicated by the recent audit of the commission's books. "It is an example to the whole world," he said.

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CIVIL SERVANTS TO PETITION THE GOVT.

Are Not Satisfied With Proposal of \$100 War Bonus for Low-Salaried Men.

The 2,500 federal civil servants of Toronto are not satisfied with the news that the Government proposes to grant a war bonus of \$100 to the lower salaried men, instead of the \$350 asked by the Civil Service Association for all men not at present receiving a war bonus.

Following the memorial presented to the Government on October 9, to which the Government promised action by the end of the month, the civil service employees are now preparing a petition which will be presented to the Government at once.

It is pointed out that the Civil Service Federation Memorial included more than a request for a War Bonus of \$350 to those who had not already received it. The employees of the Government who have already received \$350 were for a long time benefited, at least in part, by a measure of which they are now the victims, and the memorial endeavored also to remedy this.

In granting a cost of living allowance to its western employees some years ago, the Government recognized the necessity of affording relief, that was badly needed, to offset the increased cost of necessities in the Western Provinces. Since that time the cost of living east of the Great Lakes has increased so much that it is now conceded that it costs as much to live in the East as in the West.

The petition points out that average figures submitted by the chief statistician show that for the four Western Provinces the average cost of food is \$11.31, and for the four Eastern Provinces \$11.34.

Common justice was meted out to the Western postal employees when the allowance of \$180 was granted the some years ago, and the same common justice now requires that the Government should no longer make any distinction between its employees east and west of the Great Lakes.

Members of the civil service state that there are 50,000 civil servants in the employ of the Government and that the average salary in 1909 was \$229 per annum. Since that time some of them have received small increases, but the majority of the employees are receiving little more than that salary at the present time.

A Double Wedding.
